

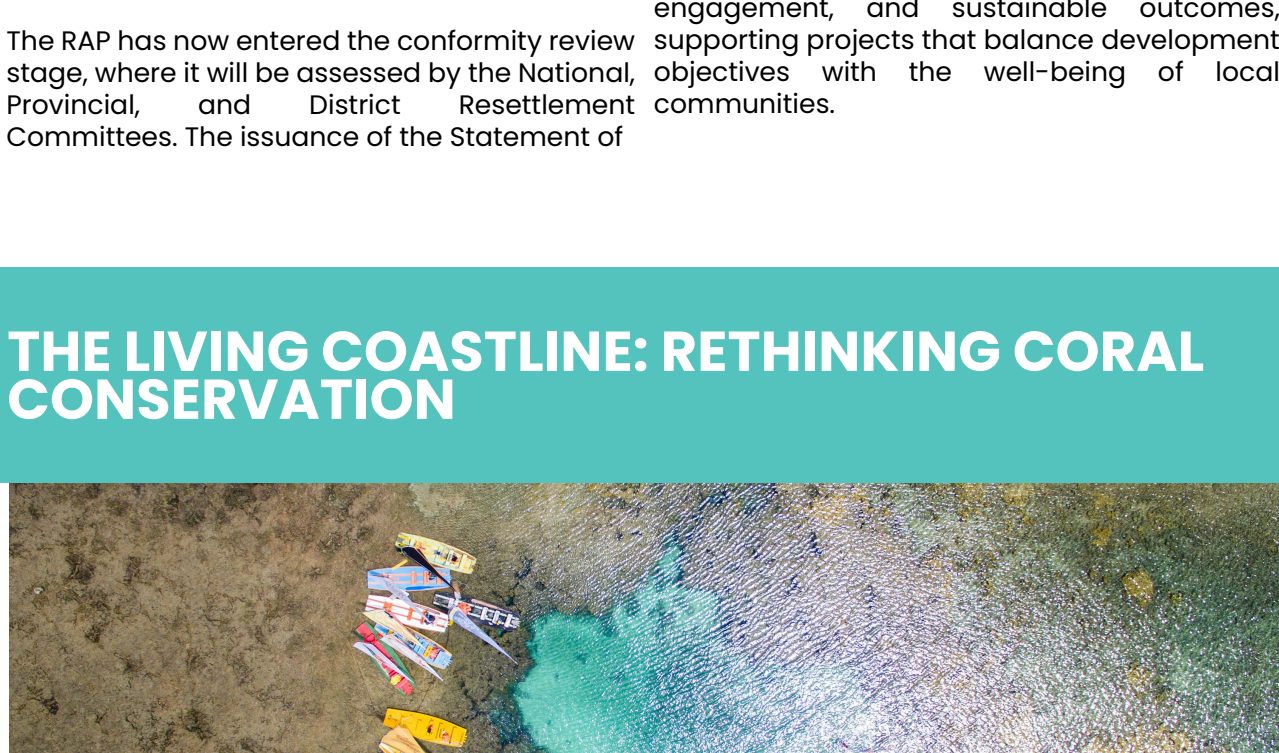

SALAMANGA RESETTLEMENT ACTION PLAN
SUCCESSFULLY SUBMITTED



RESETTLEMENT PROJECT ADVANCES TO THE
CONFORMITY REVIEW STAGE

BioVision has successfully submitted the Conformity (Parecer de Conformidade) by Resettlement Action Plan (RAP) for the Cimentos de Moçambique Salamanga Project, marking an important milestone in the project's social and environmental approval process. The submission reflects the collaborative efforts of the project team to develop a comprehensive plan that supports responsible development while safeguarding the interests of project-affected communities.

The RAP has now entered the conformity review stage, where it will be assessed by the National, Provincial, and District Resettlement Committees. The issuance of the Statement of Conformity (Parecer de Conformidade) by these three committees will represent a significant step towards the project's implementation, ensuring compliance with Mozambique's resettlement legislation and regulatory requirements.

BioVision remains committed to delivering high-quality resettlement solutions that promote transparency, stakeholder engagement, and sustainable outcomes, supporting projects that balance development objectives with the well-being of local communities.

THE LIVING COASTLINE: RETHINKING CORAL CONSERVATION



SAFEGUARDING MOZAMBIQUE'S REEFS

Coral reefs are not just homes for fish, they sustain livelihoods across Mozambique's coastline. From artisanal fishers who rely on healthy reefs for their daily catch, to women harvesting shellfish in seagrass beds, to families whose homes are shielded from storm surge by these natural barriers, entire communities are woven into the health of these ecosystems. When reefs decline, it is not only biodiversity that suffers, but food security, income, and coastal safety for the people who call these shores home.

BioVision continues its environmental monitoring programme across coral reef and seagrass ecosystems along Mozambique's coast, ensuring that project activities do not come at the expense of these fragile ecosystems or the communities that depend on them. As Environmental Monitoring Consultant, our team tracks reef condition and seagrass health to hold development to account, verifying that operations avoid harm where possible, and deliver measurable, positive outcomes for affected communities where impact cannot be fully avoided.

BioVision believes the next frontier is not preservation but stewardship: equipping coastal communities as active partners in monitoring restoration, and long-term resilience, ensuring these ecosystems continue to sustain both nature and the people who depend on them.

Over the coming months, we will review our internal processes, enhance staff awareness, and align our environmental management practices with the revised requirements. 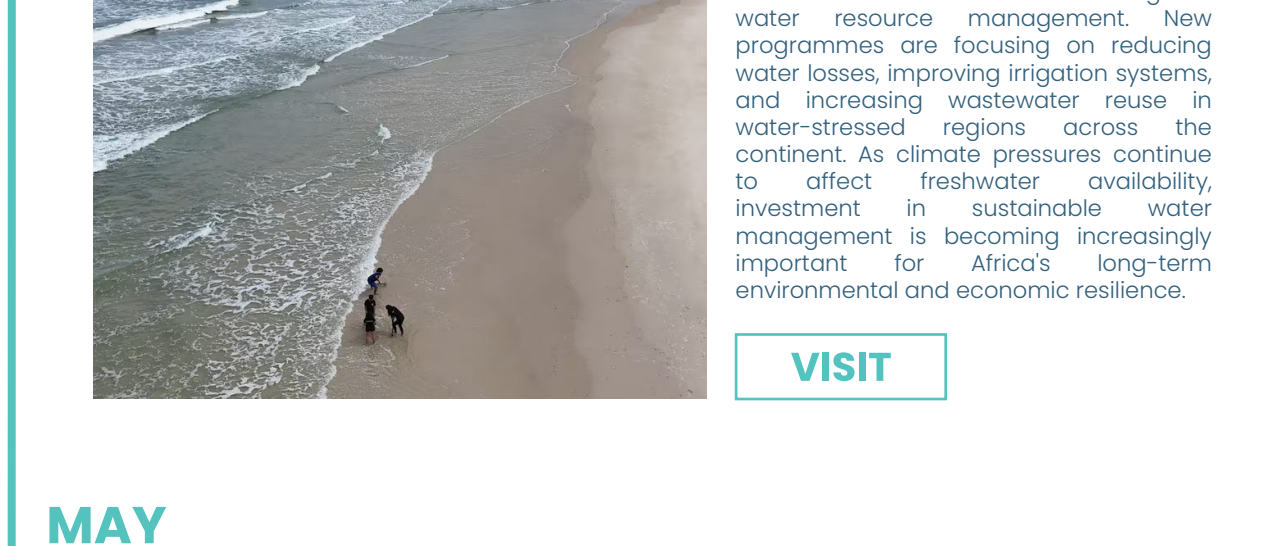
SUPPORTING THE NAMAACHA–BOANE 66KV
